WHY SCHOOL SAFETY PLAN

School safety is complex and requires differentiated strategies that promote mental health, prevent violence, provide guidance to intervene, and prepare a response to threats to school safety. Different strategies are necessary to respond to a variety of situations in your school.

The School Safety Spectrum resources are meant to assist in the development of a Comprehensive School Safety Plan. Resources are broken down into the three areas of the spectrum: prevention, intervention, and response.

ACTIVE DANGER	RESPONSE	 Activate emergency preparedness crisis response Contact district and first responder liaisons Contact social and emotional support services for students and staff Prepare to recover and get back to the business of teaching and learning

DIFFERENT LEVELS OF THREATS TO SAFETY

- Prevention —Practices and activities that support students, staff, and families to feel
 connected to the school. Use a common language that the entire school community
 understands. Teach safety protocol and practice safety procedures.
- Intervention Threats can come from individuals, social media, and rumors. Have a trained threat assessment team/process.
- Response With imminent danger, activate emergency safety protocols on which staff and students have been trained. Activate emergency communications plan.

CONNECTEDNESS IS PREVENTION

The more students feel that they belong in the school, the less likely that that will engage in risky or unsafe behaviors and the higher their level of achievement will be.

THE INFRASTRUCTURE OF BUILDING A SAFETY TEAM

Your school must be ready to respond to a variety of situations a school can face. A school safety team can use the Comprehensive School Safety Plan Checklist to assess your school's safety readiness. A team administrators, health, and mental health professionals, teachers, law enforcement, and other staff concerned about safety guides the school safety and climate activities.
